

Waste Disposal

Garbage, trash and other types of waste can be unsightly and bothersome. Waste can also create health and safety hazards. The City regulates the storage and disposal of waste in order to prevent potential health nuisances.



Waste Storage

All exterior property and the interior of every home must be free from accumulations of garbage.

Garbage must be placed into containers with tight fitting lids. The types of containers provided by refuse collection companies are acceptable.

Garbage must be removed from the site on a scheduled basis and properly disposed.

All exterior trash and recycling containers must be screened from view or stored inside a garage. You can screen trash and recycling containers with landscaping, privacy fencing or commercially produced screening enclosures.

Appliances and Furniture

Appliances, furniture and other similar items may be placed outside a maximum of 72 hours before a scheduled curbside pickup. Items should be secured to prevent them from tipping and holding water. The doors on appliances must be secured shut or removed to prevent entrapment of children.

Composting Yard Waste

Composting is permitted so long as it is done in an environmentally sound manner and meets necessary standards (see Organic Composting information).

Electronics Recycling

Electronics (any item that has a circuit board or a cathode ray tube—CRT) cannot go in the garbage according to Minnesota State Law. This includes televisions, computers, cell phones and more. You must bring your unwanted electronics to The Recycling Zone, a local electronics recycler or a retail store with an electronics recycling program.
